Well, I'm sure many of you have had cabin fever as much as my family and I have had with the winter hanging on way too long. I'm sure you're ready to get outside and enjoy the many activities offered in our region. This year, once again, will bring some changes here at the Forest Preserve.

The Forest Preserve has purchased what was the Mt. Morris Boat Club property and the property to the east with the

rented camping lots. This property consists of 28 acres of Oak Savanna and hundreds of feet of river frontage. It also is adjoined to the west to an existing 21-acre wetland that the Forest Preserve has owned for over twenty years. In total, the property will be nearly 50 acres and will have educational opportunities, recreation, and natural areas and habitat. We intend to open the new property to the public in the spring of 2014. We are still in the planning stages of deciding the recreational activities to be offered at this property. Discussions have included possibly offering some camping, picnicking, and public access from the river. Boaters would be able to enjoy a place to dock their boat and have a place under a shelter to eat and maybe enjoy a game of volleyball.

On another note, we will soon be moving our preschool program to the Keller Education Center located on the south end of the Jarrett Prairie Center parking lot. The move will provide a larger space and a more private setting with easy access to the play areas. We will also be able to expand the numbers slightly to accommodate more parents and their children.

The Forest Preserve staff looks forward to providing you with a great summer of activities. We are always trying to bring new outdoor opportunities to our patrons.

The Ghosts of the Plains

Coyote (Canis latrans)

Coyotes are members of the dog family that now live in almost all corners of the U.S. Coyotes are rarely seen; more often they are heard howling around dusk and dawn. Coyotes are nocturnal mammals that form strong family groups also known as packs. Historically, coyotes were only found in small pockets west of the Mississippi River south to Texas. Their original habitat consisted primarily of open prairies and deserts. Today, coyotes are found in all U.S. states and can thrive in almost any type of habitat. Coyotes are also now found in urban areas such as Chicago and Los Angeles.

There are a couple of reasons why coyote populations are at all-time record levels. One major reason that their populations have exploded is because of the decrease in wolf populations. Coyotes are now able to thrive in areas that were once dominated by wolves. Coyotes and wolves are mortal enemies and wolves can and will readily kill any coyote that enters a wolf pack's territory. Another major reason why coyote populations have increased is because of their cunning ability to adapt to all habitats and their remarkable hunting and scavenging abilities. Coyotes are omnivores that will eat almost anything. They hunt small mammals, rodents, birds, and will also eat snakes, frogs, berries, and they will even eat carrion (rotting animals).

For being such a fierce hunter, the coyote is actually a fairly small mammal weighing between 25-35lbs on

average. They can run at speeds of up to 40mph. Peak Coyote breeding season is between January and March with approximately a 63-day gestational period. In the spring, when female coyotes are going to give birth, they will claim or create a new den where they will birth between 2-12 pups with an average litter size of 4 pups. Coyotes can live to be 14 years of age, however in the wild, they usually die before their second birthday. Primary mortality sources include disease such as mange, collisions with vehicles, and being hunted.

Within a coyote pack, there are typically one alpha male and female. The alphas form a monogamous relationship and are the only coyotes within the pack to breed each season. It is the responsibility of the entire pack to defend their claimed territory, protect any new pups and help provide food for the pups. The genetics of the coyotes within the pack are very closely related while the alphas' genetics are not. Sometimes a coyote will leave the pack in search of a mate, to claim new territory, and ultimately form a new pack.

Coyotes do not pose immediate danger to humans. They rarely have any interactions with humans and should not be seen as threats. At the moment, coyotes are the last major predator living in our area and therefore play an important role in keeping the food chain in balance; at least until other large predators can make a comeback.



On a late winter hike into a high quality wetland or fen, a creek's floodplain, or along the base of a limestone bluff where a spring emerges, you may stumble upon a strange looking plant emerging right through the ice and snow. Skunk cabbage (Symplocarpus foetidus) is the earliest of our region's native wildflowers. This species gets a jumpstart on spring by generating its own heat allowing it to make room for growth right through a layer of snow and ice.

The skunk cabbage is a native perennial plant that emerges with small rosette leaves in the late winter or early spring soon followed by a very unusual flower structure. The flowers are in a knobby red-purple cluster called a spadix tucked inside a curved purple-red and green sheath called the spathe. The spathe remains open on one side revealing the spadix cluster inside. The skunk cabbage is generally in bloom in late March and April. The bloom occurs before the plant leaves put on much growth. The flowers emit an unpleasant odor that draws in flies and other insects, and gives the plant its common name, skunk cabbage.

By early summer, the leaves grow quite large, up to two feet long and a foot across (inset picture). They are oval shaped, hairless, and smooth along the edges with a leaf stem that will end up being about a foot long. The leaves, when crushed, also can produce an odor similar to

that of the flowers. At this same time, the spadix develops into a cluster of fruits, each with a single large seed

inside. The seeds can be carried off by an animal, but generally fall and germinate nearby. Skunk cabbage prefers light shade and consistently wet soils but not standing water for an extended time. Skunk cabbage is found in the northern half of Illinois, is an uncommon species, and the District's only colony exists at the recently acquired Howard Colman Hall Creek Preserve. It is a conservative species, meaning it does not tolerate very much disturbance and is a symbol of quality in its environment.

Restoration staff are managing the area where it is located to ensure its survival by controlling and removing invasive species like Eurasian honeysuckle and garlic mustard, and thinning common opportunistic species like box elder. In the future, seed will be collected and moved to appropriate sites at other locations to establish new populations to help ensure this interesting species long-term protection in the Byron area. ing chairs along the banks of the Rock River to do some fishing. I was targeting large flathead catfish, hoping that a river giant might have a go at my bait that evening. Contrary to the belief that catfish are "bottom-feeders", the flathead is in actuality a powerful, predatory fish which ambushes live prey from the cover of submerged rocks and brush. Growing up in Dixon, I can remember summers where it seemed like fisherman turned up 50 pounders almost daily. In June, you could toss a worm out at night and if you were patient enough you were all but guaranteed to catch a flathead. Those days are now only faded memories, as a fish kill in 2009 decimated the flathead population on the Rock River, along with many other species of fish, including the baitfish that support the survival of all the other popular game-fish. Even so, I still seek the exhilaration that comes from having a flathead on the end of my line and the opportunity

return these fish to the water, in the hopes that one day our river may once again support a stable number of large flatheads, where their role as a top predator plays an integral part in the overall health, strength, and function of the ecosystem. As I watch one of these formidable fish swim away, I imagine that even if I never catch a 50 pound flathead, our future generations will have a much better chance.

That evening, I had prepared for the slim chance I could find myself battling a monster fish, easily capable of destroying the average rod and reel. The knots in my stout line were tied tightly, the hooks were sharp, and the spot had proven itself in the past to turn up big fish. The two reels I used both had bait clickers, which alert a fisherman of a bite with the sound of ratcheting clicks when a fish gives an interested tug, but will wail out a tremendous buzzing if the fish decides to hurriedly grab the bait and take off. With everything in place, the only thing left to do was wait.

It was eerily quiet, very warm, humid, and pitch dark, with every moment cranking up the suspense more and more. A few hours had passed...nothing. Now, after having moved my bait around in a scattering of different places, it was getting late, and things around me started making sounds and coming to life. That is usually the point where I would rather leave than deal with the dreadful thoughts that can creep into your head on that kind of night, but I needed to catch a fish. That night, I sat things out just a little longer, inviting the company of some unexpected visitors. While attempting to inventory my tackle, I was startled by the sound of three unknown things dropping into the river... bloop...dunk...ker-plunk! It happened so close to me that I immediately sat back in my chair and clenched my knees as questions flooded my mind. Curiosity quickly prevailed, and I grabbed a flashlight, shin-



ing it out across the water near the bank. As I did, I saw three shadowy figures submerged, effortlessly gliding through the water, leaving a noticeable wake, heads breaching the surface, and eyes gleaming. I kept pace with them along the shore, trying to identify what they were as they swam undisturbed by my presence. Then, in unison, they balled up, dove, and disappeared in the direction of a nearby island. Gone.

I retrieved my bearings, and realized I had strayed quite a ways from the comfort of my camping chair. As I began to make my way back, I heard another new sound. All the times I have fished at night, and now what? I listened as several animals chattered, uttering the kind of sound you hear in a creepy movie scene, resembling what I thought might be raccoons, and it was coming from the island. I shone the flashlight in that direction and was completely awed to see three river otters, playful and active, on a sand bar of the island. They appeared as bandits in the night, water-slicked bodies slinking and twisting about, darting away from the searching beam of my flashlight, their reflective eyes occasionally revealing their location, as their button noses warily cased the premises. I had never seen otters on the Rock River in my entire life before that night, and, in fact, had rarely even

heard stories of anyone claiming to have caught a glimpse of one. As it turns out. the North American river otter is making a successful comeback in Illinois, where their once endangered population had been diminished to fewer than 100 statewide by 1980. Realizing that our state was in peril of seeing the otters go extinct, reintroduction efforts were carried out to save the otters, and currently the state estimates there to be 15,000 otters in Illinois. In fact, the reintroduction has been so successful, that the DNR worries there may be too many river otters, and in response has reinstated a statewide trapping season for the first time since 1929.

As the otters moved elsewhere and out of sight that night, I thought about how ironic it was that Illinois would reinstate trapping of these animals when I had just witnessed them in the wild for the first time in my life. Well, otters tend to be smarter than people give them credit for, and that has caused problems for individuals who have artificially-constructed, privately-stocked fishing ponds for personal use, as well as some owners and operators of fish hatcheries within the state. The otters are readily attracted to eat the fish found in these places, so allegedly. the best way to deal with their presence is by holding a statewide trapping season. The DNR does have a fairly rigid

set of rules that apply to river otters, but strangely, they are not the same types of lake or waterway specific restrictions which exist for some species of fish in the state. In 2009, the state reported an estimated 11,000 otters in Illinois, meaning that the population has steadily grown by around 1,000 individuals each year since. This year, the state estimates that trapping should reduce the population by approximately 2,000, and the DNR assures us that it will continue to allow future trapping seasons at least until the number of otters in Illinois are under control.

As my fishing concluded that eventful summer night, I packed up without having caught a big flathead, attempting not to let memories of the '09 fish kill creep into my head. I thought about the otters too, and I was excited at the thought of potentially seeing them again. After having experienced the otters that night, I realized how strange it was that they had never been there before. I felt that they were as natural to the river as the flathead catfish, and I couldn't help but wonder whose responsibility it would be if we didn't have either one. Indeed, the conclusive fact is that we all play a role in making sure that these things will be there, not only for ourselves, but also for future generations to appreciate.

Turf **Notes**

Matt Henkel Golf Course Superintendent

A record breaking weather year in 2012 brought us early and persistent warmth that started in March and continued all through the golf season. March threw at us seven days above 80 degrees when the average high is around 45 degrees. My youngest daughter, Mara, happened to be born on March 14th. The temperature reached 82 degrees that day. Rarely do I find myself worrying about the course that early in the year, but there I was holding our new baby in the hospital thinking we had better get the irrigation system fired up. Fast forward to today. As I sit here typing this update, nearly a year later, the temperature is 25 degrees and there is 6 inches of snow on the ground. Golf is still a few weeks away, but we have learned that things can and do change in a hurry. We are ready.

2013 will bring with it continued improvements to the golf course. We took advantage of some excess soil excavated from the site of the new maintenance facility to push forward with a couple of projects on the course. We are in the process of rebuilding the white tee on hole #7. This tee was well undersized and provided very little level teeing surface. The tee should be open for play by Memorial Day. We are also eliminating five sand traps from the course's layout. Holes seeing a reduction in bunkers include #3, #4, #9, and #17. All selected traps have had the sand removed and soil hauled in to replace it. Some shaping work remains and we plan to have these areas seeded and grown in by Memorial Day as well. Finally, late last fall, we designated about five acres worth of no-mow cool season rough areas that will be converted to native warm season grasses. While it takes a few years for the natives to fully establish, you will notice a distinctive difference in the appearance of these areas this year. Come on out and see for yourself. It's going to be a great year!






