## Fortune 500 Speaker Coming To Byron

School Celebrates Red Ribbon Week March 30-April 3

While Red Ribbon Week is typically recognized in October, last summer Byron District #226 decided to move its celebration to March 30 - April 3. It was with good reason that such a decision was made. During that week, Milton Creagh, a nationally acclaimed motivational speaker, will be presenting to students and parents from Byron, Mt. Morris, Oregon, and Stillman Valley communities.

Milton Creagh is an internationally known drug prevention speaker for conferences, conventions, youth rallies and workshops. Milton has been on the public speaking circuit since the age of 17. After hearing Milton speak at a collegiate student rally in 1978, President Gerald Ford commented that he had met very few people who impressed him as Milton had.

Milton's professional and community activities have brought him many honors and awards such as: The J.C. Penney Golden Rule Award for his work with teens in Atlanta, Ga.; BellSouth Services' Golden Eagle Award for contributions to Florida A&M University's School of Business and Industry; Keys to the cities of Memphis, Jackson, and Murfreesboro, Tennesee, and Wilson, North Carolina; 1989 United States Congressional Proclamation for his work with inner city kids and the 1991 FBI Director's Community Leadership Award.

Besides Mr. Creagh's presentations, many other activities are being planned for that week. Student activities are being planned at each grade level throughout the district. Staff from Rosecrance, a residential substance abuse treatment center, will be doing a drug and alcohol awareness inservice for all district staff. There will also be a more comprehensive training for a core team of staffat each site. This will help staff be better prepared to handle situations involving drugs and alcohol within our schools.

#### **Outstanding Business Achievement Award**

Represents a business organized for profit that has made a significant contribution to promote general welfare of the Byron Community or has made a significant contribution to the industry, trade or profession of the business. The recipient of this award shall be a member of the Byron Area Chamber of Commerce. The Selection Committee may consider the efforts that the business has made in development, progress and growth in the areas of commerce, industry, agriculture, education, and culture. This award shall be given annually by the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

#### Outstanding Achievement Award

Represents an individual or not-for-profit organization that has contributed volunteer service to the betterment of the Byron community over a period of several years.

The selection Committee may consider the following factors:

a. Business community service (e.g., Chamber, economic development, etc.)

- b. Civic community service (e.g., city council, fire, school, park, forest preserve, library, museum board (s))
- Church community
- Service organizations (e.g., Lions, Kiwanis, People Helping People, 4-H, Women's Club, etc.)

The recipient of this award shall epitomize volunteer service to the Byron community. This is an extraordinary award that shall be given only in the event that the Selection Committee determines such an individual or organization has contributed the requisite service and years to the community. This award is not necessarily given annually.

#### Citizen of the Year

Represents an individual that has made a significant volunteer contribution to the betterment of the Byron community in that particular year. The selection committee may consider the following factors:

- a. Business community service (e.g., Chamber, economic developments, etc.)
- b. Civic community service (e.g., city council, fire, school, park, forest preserve, library, museum board (s))
- c. Church community
- d. Service organizations (e.g., Lions, Kiwanis, Caring & Sharing, People Helping People, 4-H, Women's Club, Jaycees, etc.)

This award shall be given annually by the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

## **Star Notes**

As March proceeds, the light of the Milky Way rides high in the sky and several of the Zodiac constellations reign supreme. The bright stars of Taurus, Gemini, and Leo grace the skies and the light of the Beehive Cluster, Praesepe, draws the eye to the dimmer shape of Cancer, the Crab. Orion and his faithful hunting dog, Canis Major, stride across the sky farther south. March gives us the best time to view the planet Mercury for 1998. If the weather cooperates, Mercury should be visible for the two weeks preceding March 20, early in the evening after the sun sets in the west.

April brings us the Lyrid Meteor shower, visible from the 16th through the 25th, with a peak on Wednesday the 22nd. These meteors will be most visible after 10:30 pm and into the early morning hours. April also brings the return of Virgo, the Virgin, and the Virgo cluster of galaxies. Hydra (below left), the largest constellation, snakes its way up over the southern horizon below Leo and Virgo.

May comes with warmer weather and a later setting sun. Now dropping into the west, Gemini prepares to bid us farewell until next November. Hercules, the strong man, makes his return to the evening skies and so does Vega, the first of the summer triangle stars. This is a good time of year for galaxy hunting. The area between Ursa Major, Virgo, and Leo abounds in deep sky objects if the sky is dark, clear and calm and the hunter is patient.

Public viewing nights are on the first and third Saturdays and second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. The Observatory is closed if it is cloudy. Please call 815-234-8535 to confirm viewing

conditions. Sessions start about dusk and last until about 10 pm and are free. Please dress for the weather as the dome is not heated.

The Weiskopf Observatory is also available for private tours. The program includes fun and interesting activities relating to constellations, the solar system, stars and star movements, telescopes and constellation myths. Cost is \$2 per person and tours can be arranged by calling Lisa at 815-234-8535 ext. 232.



However, starting June 15, only alternative, nonmetal type golf spikes or tennis shoes will be permitted. Any 1998 season passholder who has not picked up their free set of "SOFTSPIKES" can stop by starting Friday, March 6 when regular Mon.-Sat. hours of operation resume.

#### **Turf Notes**

Because the Byron Forest Preserve's Capital Construction crews completed so many projects at PrairieView in 1997, I would like to present to you a quick review of the year's major accomplishments before outlining our goals for 1998.


In the spring, crews built two shelters, one near the practice putting green to house vending machines, and one at the driving range tee which contains pop, golf ball dispensers plus ball storage and washing facilities.

As weather warmed, construction of new forward tees began. Tees 7, 11, and 12 were completed and should open for play by May of 1998. Crews also built a series of moguls in the right and the left rough along 6 fairway. Construction began on forward 6, 15, and 2 tees.

During the growing season, 32,000 containergrown prairie plants were installed at various locations near the front door sign, the clubhouse entrance, 1 and 9 greens, 7/11 fairways, and 8 tee. In August, 760 tons of sand were added to Prairie View's bunkers.

This fall, we contracted a tree spade to transplant 33 trees (4 deciduous and 29 evergreens) on the course in the 10 green/11 tee, 9 tee/8 green area, and around 2 green/3 tee. Workers hand planted 11 crabapples behind 18 green.

Feste and Company built concrete wall stone planters at 1, 4, 5, 6, 11, and 17 tees. Capital workers supplied the backhoe work and materials. At 8, 13, and 15 tees, the crews constructed limestone planters. Two limestone planters in the clubhouse parking lot were removed. The mature prairie plants in them plus several hundred purple coneflowers donated by Diane Balch were transplanted into new planters near the clubhouse entrance, 6, 15, and 17 tees. Crews completed shrub and perennial plantings near 1 and 10 tees.

During January and February of 1998, capital crews reorganized and repainted the interior of the old Park Maintenance building. Included was the construction of new combined Maintenance/Restoration offices. This will streamline maintenance operations, make them more cost effective, while allowing the department to serve the public better.

As soon as weather permits, work will begin to complete the landscaping around PrairieView's newly enlarged clubhouse. This includes construction of a patio on the south lawn overlooking the 10th tee and the 9th green.

Crews will begin once more to build new forward tees. The general order of priority is 6, 15, 2, 16, 1, 10, 5, 18, 8, and 17. We will continue to build stone planters at the remaining tee areas. These planters add aesthetic value to our tee accessory areas and eliminate costly hand trimming.

On the planting scene, the Byron Forest Preserve will transplant more large trees for safety, aesthetic, and screening purposes. Proposed locations involve the 1 tee/10 green/9 tee/8 green area, 15 fairway, clubhouse, pumphouse, and the front door sign area. Proposed locations for several thousand more containergrown prairie plants include many of the new tee planters, 9 green, 13 green, and along German Church Road.

It is our hope that through these construction projects, we can more fully develop the great potential of PrairieView Golf Course, and that it can become a truly notable facility, providing a safe, environmentally pleasing, challenging golf experience to all who come here to play.
