

Christmas **Tree Facts**

- Just one acre of Christmas trees produce the daily oxygen requirement for 18 people. During photosynthesis, trees absorb carbon dioxide which is a greenhouse gas, and emit oxygen for breathing. For every full grown tree that is cut, two to three seedlings are planted in its place. This is even better for the environment because young trees have a greater rate of photosynthesis than the older trees they have replaced.
- Christmas trees are often grown on land that is unsuitable for farming. By utilizing these fields, tree farmers help to control soil erosion and provide year-round wildlife habitat.

Star Notes




Winter is coming and it brings cold, clear nights perfect for star viewing. The Pleides and Taurus the Bull are already visible in the November skies. The constellations, Pegasus and Andromeda, are high, giving good views of the Andromeda Galaxy. One of our nearest neighbors, the Andromeda galaxy is 2.4 million light years away. The bright stars forming the Summer Triangle, Altair, Deneb, and Vega, are dropping into the west now while Jupiter and Saturn are high in the south. Perseus, Cassiopia, and Auriga all hold interesting stars and star clusters.

Looking ahead to December and January, the winter constellations take the stage. Orion and Gemini will rise in the east, starting a little higher each night. Orion brings the great Orion Nebula. Visible through binoculars, it's a real treat in the telescope. Gemini and Auriga hold a string of interesting star clusters. Jupiter and Saturn will remain visible for most of the month. Winter also brings us the brightest star visible from Earth. Sirius, the dog star, is a part of the constellation Canis Major. Canis Major is Orion's faithful hunting dog, following at his heels for all eternity.

January brings the first lunar eclipse for the year 2000. Late on the night of January 20 the moon will begin to slide into the Earth's shadow. We'll hope for clear skies and a chance to watch the moon's light fade from bright white to dusky orange as the Earth moves between it and the sun. Expect to stay up late if you want to see the moon return to full sunlight. Be sure to dress warm for this late night treat.

February brings us the return of Cancer and Leo. The Crab and The Lion are the harbingers of spring to come as the stars proceed in their celestial dance of seasons. Join us on a Public Viewing night as we explore the heavenly wonders of the night sky.


Public Viewing nights are on the first and third Saturdays and second and fourth Tuesdays of each



month. The Observatory is closed if it is cloudy. Please call (815)-234-8535 to confirm viewing conditions. Sessions start about dark and last until about 10 p.m. and are free. Please dress for the weather as the dome is not heated.

The Weiskopf Observa-tory is avail-

able for private tours. The program includes fun and interesting activities relating to constellations, the Solar system, stars and star movements, telescopes and constellation myths. Cost is \$2 per person and tours can be arranged by calling Lisa at the above number, extension 232.



Kids and the Environment

Pine Cone Bird Feeder

When it gets cold, birds that don't migrate, or fly south for the winter, need to eat more frequently to keep warm. Unfortunately, there's not as much food available in winter as there is during the warmer months. You can help feed the birds by making a pine cone bird feeder.

You will need:

Large pine cone
Wax paper
Peanu butter
Birdsed
Butterknife
Three feet of string

First, place a sheet of wax paper on a flat surface and cover it with birdseed. Next, using a butter knife, spread the peanut butter all over your pine cone, making sure to fill in the gaps. Roll your peanut butter pine cone around in the birdseed you have placed on the wax paper. After the pine cone is coated with the birdseed, tie one end of the string to the top of the pine cone and the other to a tree branch in your yard. Lastly, sit back in the cozy warmth of your home and watch the birds come to your feeder.

Seeds Traveling New Places

Seeds are traveling to new places. Some seeds drop close to the the plant that produced them, while others explode out and away. Some seeds hitch rides from animals to new places such as by blue jays and squirrels that plan to eat them over the winter. The flower head of one plant called Queen Anne's Lace forms a basket filled with seeds. When the basket opens, the seeds blow away.

Animals in Fall

Autumn acts as a signal for various animals to prepare for the cold winter months to come. Different groups of animals prepare in different ways. A colony of ants stores food underground. A brace of ducks flies south, toward warmer weather. How might a leash of foxes, a bale of turtles, a hive of bees or a school of fish prepare for the cold in autumn? What things do you do during autumn?

This has been a problem in past years, but we have been patrolling during the hunting seasons and it seems to discourage people from hunting the property. Illinois law does not grant the right of trespass for the purpose of retrieving wounded or crippled wildlife. You must secure permission from the landowner or tenant before entering any property. Ideal weather conditions on September 11th helped David Melms of Dekalb establish a new men's blue tee course record of 69. Dave went on to win his first Golf Medal Championship with a 144 total, one stroke better than former champion John Robertson of Rockford. Congratulations on a great round of golf!

Landscape Construction At PrairieView

apital construction crews have been busy again this year at PrairieView Golf Course. They built tees, planters, and structures. They also planted trees, bushes, flowers, native grasses and forbes.

On the tee front, staff finished 10 white tee, 11 gold, blue and white tees, 7 gold and white tees, 3 gold tee and 4 gold tee. The gold tee on 7 is actually double tee tucked in among the oak trees. As long as conditions permit, workers will continue to haul soil to and shape 12 gold tee plus alternate 13 / 14 gold, blue, white and red tees.

This spring, we planted, staked, and mulched 148 new trees on the course and in the clubhouse landscape area. Trees ranged in size from 2 ½ caliper inches to four caliper inches in diameter. We also planted 50 - 1 ½ caliper hybrid popular trees in the secondary roughs along the left side of 11 and 12 fairways. These trees grow 5'- 8' per year in a nice shade tree form. They will provide much needed definition along those holes until the hardwood trees grow into maturity.

Crews constructed new landscape planters at 1 tee, 12 tee, 15 tee, the clubhouse entry way, the putting green shelter, and east of the golf cart parking lot. Work is in progress on a paver stone / native grass planter around the clubhouse flag pole.

In miscellaneous construction, crews built a concrete area with steel reinforced wood fence to house the clubhouse fuel tank and garbage dumpsters. East of the pavilion, they built a grill/cooking shelter on a concrete pad including wall stone planters and landscaping. They landscaped and seeded the areas south and west of the pavilion.

In August, capital workers began hauling soil to an area west of the clubhouse. This is the future site of PrairieView's new practice center. Work will continue during the fall of 1999 and into the spring of 2000. When completed, the practice center will provide a chipping green, a pitching green, and an additional putting green.

Next year, we will continue planting trees and native plants, rebuilding tees and constructing new landscape planters at PrairieView Golf Course. In the planning stages for 2000 are a new limestone outcrop planter for the clubhouse entrance and some much needed improvements for PrairieView's driving range.

Golf Course Open for Play in November/December

PrairieView Golf Course will remain open for golf on a day-to-day basis in November and possibly into December subject to weather conditions. Superintendent Steve Storz will close the course for the year once the greens and ground begin to freeze. Golfers playing on dormant, partially frozen putting surfaces greatly increase the likelihood of serious damage, according to Superintendent Storz.

Last year, an unbelievable warm-up in late November/early December weather that lasted for nearly two weeks allowed heavy play right up to mid-December. Let's hope we're swinging golf clubs and not snow shovels this December as well.

Special End-of-Season Golf/Cart Rates: For November and December, golfers need only pay PrairieView's regular nine-hole, weekday or weekend green fee and cart rates to play either nine or eighteen holes. In addition, the regular season 5:30 twilight green fee and cart rates will move up to 2:30 p.m. each day in November and December. Season golf passes are valid for play until the course closes for the season.

November/December Hours: PrairieView Golf Course hours (if course is open for play) are as follows: Monday-Sunday, 9a.m.-4:30p.m. (weather permitting). If the course is not open for play, hours are as follows: Tuesday-Saturday, 10a.m.-4:30p.m. Please call ahead (234-4653) to be sure current course and weather conditions permit opening the course that day. Reservations will be accepted just 24 hours in advance due to variable weather conditions such as frost, severe cold, and possibly even snow.

Clubhouse Services Available: Basic concession and snack items will be available on a daily basis as well as pro shop merchandise and services, golf carts, and rental equipment. The practice range will remain open on a day-to-day basis in November subject to usage and weather conditions. Season passes, vouchers, and gift certificates may be purchased whenever the clubhouse is open. Golfers may call 234-4653 for more information.


