Mary Morgan Students Participate in **Knowledge Master**

Thousands of students from practically every state and several countries competed January 19, 2000 in the 22nd Elementary Knowledge Master Open academic competition. The teams, generally consisting of fifth and sixth grade students, used computers to answer 100 challenging questions from all curriculum areas.

The team of fourth and fifth grade students from Mary Morgan School in Byron scored 691 of 1000 possible points, ranking them as seventh in the nation and second in the state of Illinois among the 330 fifth grade teams.

Mary Morgan School has participated in this event for the last ten years and although they consistently are in the top ten percent of participating schools, this is only the second time that they have made it into the top ten schools in the nation.

The Knowledge Master open is designed to stimulate enthusiasm for learning and recognition for academic accomplishment. Two contests are run each year on classroom computers to allow all students the opportunity to compete in a large academic event without the expense of traveling to a central site. Results are tabulated into overall, state and enrollmentsize rankings by Academic Hallmarks, a Colorado publishing firm that hosts the event.

Outstanding Business Achievement Award





You should also check out the new museum scrap book, located on the corner of the prairie. It chronicles the early years of the museum and it's exhibits. Compare these early photos with what we have now. What a difference!



As March approaches, the light of the Milky Way rides high in the sky and several of the Zodiac constellations reign supreme. The bright stars of Taurus, Gemini and Leo grace the skies and the light of the Beehive Cluster, Praesepe, draws the eye to the dimmer shape of Cancer, the Crab. Orion and his faithful hunting dog, Canis Major, stride across the sky in the southwest. This is a good time of year for open star clusters. Auriga, Gemini and Canis Major hold groups of stars visible in a telescope.

In April as the weather turns warmer, the winter constellations Taurus, Orion and Canis Major are quickly disappearing in the west, while Leo stands overhead and Bootes and Hercules rise in the east. April also brings the return of Virgo, the Virgin, and the Virgo cluster of galaxies. Hydra, the largest constellation, snakes it's way up over the southern horizon below Leo and Virgo.

May comes with warmer weather and a later setting sun. Now dropping into the west, Gemini prepares to bid us farewell until next November. Hercules, the strong man, climbs higher in the sky, followed by Vega, the first of the summer triangle stars. This is a good time of year for galaxy hunting. The area between Ursa Major, Virgo, and Leo abounds in deep sky objects if the sky is dark, clear and calm and the hunters is patient.

Public Viewing nights are on the first and third Saturdays and second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. The Observatory is closed if it is cloudy. Please call (815)-234-8535 to confirm viewing conditions. Sessions start about dark and last until about 10 p.m. and are free. Please dress for the weather as the dome is not heated.

The Weiskopf Observatory is also available for private tours. The program includes fun and interesting activities relating to constellations, the solar system, stars and star movements, telescopes and constellation myths. Cost is \$2.00 per person and tours can be arranged by calling Lisa at the above number, extension 232.


Amphibians Alive

We have a new live animal at the Jarrett Prairie Center! If you liked Pebbles, the box turtle, and D.C. the fox snake, your going to love Bruce the salamander. Bruce is an Eastern Tiger Salamander. Tiger Salamanders are common and native to most of the United States. Bruce was given to the Byron Forest Preserve by John Conner of Leaf River. It seems that Bruce lived in the science lab at the Leaf River High School until it closed and then moved in with the Conners. That means that Bruce is over ten years old! No one at the school could remember where he came from, so he could be even older than that.

Salamanders are amphibians, that means that they have moist, glandular skins, not at all like the dry scales of a reptile. Amphibians spend the first part of their lives in a larval stage, living in the water and breathing through gills (like a tadpole). Most amphibians develop to spend the later part of their lives living on land and breathing air (like a frog). One easy way to tell the difference between an amphibian and a reptile is to look at it's feet (if it has any). A reptile has claws on his toes and an amphibian has soft clawless feet often with webs between the toes. I bet you knew that the dinosaurs were all reptiles. But did you know that amphibians lived on the earth 10,000,000 years before the first dinosaurs?

Having Bruce here will be a great opportunity to compare reptiles to amphibians. So make some time to come out to the Jarrett Center to meet Bruce, our new salamander. Don't forget to say hello to D.C. and Pebbles while you're here. Af-

ter all, whether you are a reptile or an amphibian, it's nice to have friends!

The Byron Forest Preserve hosts thousands of people every year for field trips. Field trips are a wonderful opportunity for groups to get a quick introduction to the Forest Preserve and a look at the world of nature. Many tour options are available including prairie walks, museum tours, observatory tours, and orienteering. On the Earthwalk, children are encouraged to explore the outdoors with all their senses, thus fostering a love of nature and a desire to care for the environment. They are guided into a respect for living things through hands-on experiences with live creatures, our teaching snake, D.C., and Pebbles our box turtle in our natural history museum. Sessions can be tailored for scout groups doing badge work.

Tours can be geared for preschoolers through senior citizens and can last from one to four hours. The cost is \$1.00 per person per hour and tours should be booked at least two weeks ahead. Call 234-8535 ext. 232 to book your tour today.

Maple Syrup Festival and Pancake Breakfast March 18, 2000, 7-11 a.m.

The Prairie Restoration Department of the Byron Forest Preserve District will once again be hosting a Maple Syrup Festival on Saturday, March 18, from 7-11 am. The Kiwanis Club of Byron will supply a pancake breakfast featuring delicious pure maple syrup. We will also be offering hayrides out to the Sugar Maple woods to tour the tapped trees, and viewing of the syrup processing. This is quite an interesting and historic procedure, and everyone is encouraged to come out and experience it first hand.

All of the Sugar Maple sap is collected by the restoration department and processed in the evaporator in the expo building. Ideal weather for sap collection is freezing nights and warm, sunny days above 40 degrees. These conditions force sap into the trees' roots at night and up to the branches during the day. This causes sap to flow past the spile (a spout driven into the tree) and out into a bucket hanging from the spile. Sap is collected from the woods by hand and ends up in a holding tank in the Expo building. Sap travels from this tank into an evaporator where a hot fire heats the sap to boiling. Eventually, almost all of the water is boiled off, the resulting syrup is filtered twice and the maple syrup is bottled and cooled. With over 150 taps on the preserve and local Sugar Maples, we collected 1500 gallons of sap last year! This year, we plan to expand our taps to over 200.

At the Jarrett Prairie Center on the same day, Master Gardeners is sponsoring their spring gardening clinics. There will be talks on gardening and prairie plants and restoration. Feel free to come on up after breakfast and sit in on some of the programs.

The Maple Syrup Festival and Pancake Breakfast will be held at the Byron Forest Preserve's Expo Building. Enter off River Road, just east of our main entrance. There will be plenty of parking just outside of the facility. The cost for the breakfast will be a nominal fee, with proceeds benefitting area charities. Tickets will be available for purchase from Kiwanis and Key Club members, so watch for ticket sales to begin. The hayrides and tours are free. The day promises to be enjoyable, educational, and delicious! Please mark your calendars for this event and watch for ticket sales to begin!

From the Beekeeper.....The Dead Hive

You approach the hive with trepidation. After all, there have been signs of inactivity during the winter. On this beautiful spring day, there are only a smattering of bees buzzing around. There's none of that whirling exuberance of the emerging hive. You hope against hope, but suspect that they are robber bees. You take off the covers and peer down. Nothing. Curled bees clinging to the edges. Bees sticking out of coffin-like cells. The silence is so complete, so out of place, so unnerving that you lean close to the hive expecting to hear something. Not a whisper. There's a smell of honey mixed with something putrid B a sulfury stench. It's the odor of dead insects. While cracking open the hive bodies, a cluster of dead bees fall to the bottom board. A pile of corpses lies on the ground below the entrance. The hive is dead.

You wonder about the horrors that occurred inside a slowly dying hive. Although you don't want to over-ascribe human qualities to bees, they were living beings and surely dying must have been hard on them. Did they realize they were dying? Did they suspect that the entire hive was in peril? Did the queen lose her spirit, and the rest of the hive follow suit? Did some bees see the future and try to get the rest of the hive to find a new home? Did other bees try to escape? Was there mutiny at the end, with the workers trying to create a new queen? Did a new queen fight with the old one, and in their weakened state both perish?

Thinking back to the fall, when you went into the hive it was a thick boiling cauldron of life. It was bubbling over with energy, willingness to work and the impetus to live. What could have changed all that in a few short months?

You think of the efforts, expense and risks involved in beginning anew. Buying and installing a package, feeding it sugar water, adding more frames and hoping it takes. It seems like such an avoidable waste and yet, what else is there to do? Not filling up the box, leaving it empty seems like a crime against nature.

Walking away from the scene you stare back at the hive from a distance. It looks like a smokestack, like any other hive gleaming white in the warm sun. You see it more like a grave stone, tinged with sadness. But next to the dead hive are your other hives bursting with life. These hives have made it through the winter. Like life, there is both success and failure in beekeeping. Like life, there is both the island of the living and the island of the dead. So rather than view your apiarist career as a long winding road of defeat and loss, you consider all the good you've done. All the living that these colonies have done, all the generations of bees that you have helped to support and all of the beautiful flowers that you have helped pollinate give you the inspiration and energy to continue and start anew.

Praireview Construction Update

very productive for construction crews at PrairieView Golf Course. They built tees, planters, structures and planted trees, bushes, flowers, native grasses and forbes.

In the spring, they planted, staked, and mulched 148 new 2 1/2 -4" hard wood trees on the course and in the clubhouse landscape, plus 50 hybrid poplar trees in the 11 and 12 fairways. This fall we purchased 65 assorted 1"-1/2 "B&B trees on a closeout sale from a local nursery", which were planted in various locations on the course. Varieties include sugar maples, hawthorns, crab apples, Bradford Pears and river birch. Late in November crews using

Last year, 1999, was our 44" tree spade began removing 6' English oaks from Byron Forest Preserve's south nursery and planting them at selected sites PrairieView Golf Course. This will continue in the spring of 2000. We ex-200-300 trees.

Using concrete wall stones and limestone, staff constructed new landscape planters at tees # 1, secondary roughs left of 4, 12, 15, the clubhouse entry, the putting green shelter and east of the golf cart parking lot. In miscellaneous construction capital workers built a concrete enclosure with a wood fence to house the garbage clubhouse dumpsters and fuel tank, a cooking shelter including concrete pad and driveway, wall stone planters

and landscaping east of the golf pavilion and paved walkways around the clubhouse flagpole, which were complemented by a planting of native grasses and forbes. In 2000 we expect to build limestone or wall stone planters at pect to move a total of tees # 2, 3, 7, 18 and a limestone outcropping/ planter around the clubhouse entry sign at German Church road.

Capital crews renovated PrairieView's front door sign area in September, moving some extremely tall prairie forbes to the three oaks prairie and replacing them with 4,000 prairie grasses including Panicum, Big Bluestem, Little Bluestem and Canadian Ryegrass. This area inside the fence at the intersection of German Church and River

Roads should be quite spectacular in two years. 1999 saw the comple-

tion of the new #10 white and red tees, #11 gold, blue and white, #7 gold and blue, #4 gold and blue, #3 gold tee and moguls in the rough between 3 fairway and 4 tee. Except for #10 which was seeded, all tees were sodded. They should be ready for play in May of Crews also in 2000. 1999 hauled and dumped several thousand yards of soil west of the clubhouse where our dozer operator began shaping what will become PrairieView's new practice center. When completed in 2000 it will include a chipping green, a pitching green and another putting

the basement for the new Byron fire station hauled and dumped over 2,000 cubic yards of fill soil at locations PrairieView Golf Course. Soil and trucking were absolutely free!! first is the site of the new alternate tee at the south end of the driving range. Crews will cap this fill with topsoil and then seed it in 2000. The plan is to have this tee operational by September when we close regular tees to enlarge them. The second site to receive soil was tee # 6 where our dozer shaped and compacted the base for the new gold tee. In 2000 capital crews will cap the base with top soil. At the same time the dozer will reshape the north half of # 6 blue tee.

Proposed tee con-

struction for 2000 listed in order of highest priority is as follows; #13 alternate tees, # 14 tee (all areas south of the cart path), #12 white tee, # 8 blue/ gold tees, # 12 gold tee. With the scheduled completion of the practice center, driving range alternate tee and the expansion of existing driving range tees, 2000 promises to be another busy year Byron Forest Preserve's capital construction crew.
