

Your fire department now has a web site. In an effort to keep the public informed and to provide a source of information on many different topics, the fire department can now be reached via the Internet at

http://www.byronfire.com.

Now in its infancy, the site has some general information and a mailbox for suggestions, etc. In the future it will bring information on many fire prevention tips for the household as well as suggestions on health tips. There will be a form that you can fill out to ask questions of the fire department or offer suggestions.

Surveys have shown that many households have Internet service available at home, and the future will bring an even higher percentage. The site is still under basic construction but does have many articles and pictures in it now.

If you have a problem finding the site with your browser, please contact us with the name of the browser and the problem that you are having. Right now there are some pictures of calls that the fire department has responded to as well as information on classes that are put on for the public. In the future there will be a form to sign up for classes and a special apparatus page depicting the fire department's vehicles and a featured vehicle that will allow the user to click on a compartment door to see what is behind the door. There will also be an area for the children to visit featuring Sparky the firedog and offering fire prevention and burn prevention tips and quizzes for them to take.

This is another media to keep the public informed and educated and to help them avoid or better equip them to handle emergencies. Don't forget the site for Byron too, at http://www.byronillinois.org. It has just opened its doors on the Internet and will be growing, too. The agencies of the City of Byron, Forest Preserve, Fire Department, Byron Schools, Library District, Museum District, Park District and the Byron Chamber of Commerce have teamed up to put the site on the Internet and provide a POP in the Byron area. This means that people in the Byron area can enjoy Internet service without the cost of EAS (Extended Area Service) charges on their phone bill. The other services such as AOL, MSN and AT&T have Rockford numbers. Although they are toll free, there are EAS charges that can add up, too. Over 100 people have signed up so far for the Byron area Internet services. Students have created many of the pages that are on the site. This provides them with a real life project while taking the Web Page HTML classes. They meet with the agency to help design what they want for their site then return to the classroom to create the site for the agency. This not only saves tax dollars but gives the student real life experiences in the art of creating and maintaining web sites using HTML. This is a win-win for the Byron area. Happy surfing, and don't forget to visit our sites often as they are constantly changing.

Backyard astronomy series for 1999

"We are voyagers on the Earth through space, as passengers on a ship, and many of us have never thought of any part of the vessel but the cabin where we are quartered." -S.P. Langley.

Here's a chance to step outside our Earth ship and explore the depths of the ocean of space. Learn how to identify the constellations. Discover what equipment to use. Activities and demonstrations will focus on a different topic each month. Programs run on the third Tuesday of the month unless otherwise noted, times vary. If weather permits, there will be time afterward for skyviewing. Binoculars are always helpful. Cost is \$2 per person with a \$10 family max. STAR NOTES

March shows us five planets in the sky during the early part of the month. On the evenings of March 5 and 6, Mercury and Jupiter are as close in the sky as they can get. They are both low in the southwest and will quickly drop into the suns glare and will be lost to us by the end of the month. Climbing higher in the southwest is bright Venus. As the month progresses, it will approach higher Saturn and by March 19 they will appear to be close together. Mars rises later in the evening in the west but does not get high enough for good viewing until closer to midnight.

April is a good month for Mars viewing. As the Earth swings round in its orbit, we overtake slower Mars and reach the point where we are closest to it. By the end of April, Mars will be visible all night. Venus continues to brighten the western sky in the early evening. The winter constellations Taurus, Orion and Canis Major are quickly disappearing in the west, while Leo stands overhead and Bootes and Hercules rise in the east.

May brings us longer days and spring flowers. Reddish Mars hangs high in the east while bright Venus shines in the west. In between lies the realm of galaxies. The Coma/Virgo cluster lies just behind Leo and holds hundreds of galaxies. These tiny puffs of light are actually giant cities of billions of stars, millions of light years away. Too faint to be seen by the eye or binoculars, some

are visible in the telescope on dark, clear

nights.

Public Viewing nights are on the first and third Saturdays and second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. The Observatory is closed if it is cloudy. Please call (815)-234-8535 to confirm viewing conditions. Sessions start about dark and are free. Please dress for the weather as the dome is not heated.

The Weiskopf Observatory is also available for private tours. The program includes fun and interesting activities relating to constellations, the Solar system, stars and star movements, telescopes and constellation myths. Cost is \$2.00 per person, and tours can be arranged by calling Lisa at the above number, extension 232.

What is the edge?

Many natural areas have them...fence rows, scrubby patches of briars and saplings, in other words--edge. Also known as an ecotone, edge is the division between one habitat type and another. While edge was previously believed to attract wildlife, recent studies indicate that this habitat type plays a definite role in habitat fragmentation and habitat destruction of native grassland and forest birds.



In pre-settlement days, the vast expanse of prairie was home to countless ground nesting birds. These creatures were but a fraction of one of the largest and most stable ecosystems known. As we have plowed, fenced, colonized, and otherwise dismembered the great prairie, so have we eliminated the very specific habitat needed to support these area sensitive birds. Acres and acres of continuous habitat are required for feeding, breeding, and nesting. When interrupted by fence rows and scrubby woods, the ecological value of the natural area is compromised.

These edge areas attract species like cowbirds that compete with the native species for resources and nesting sites. Some birds even act as parasites and lay their eggs in the nests of other birds. These foreign eggs hatch earlier and produce larger offspring that can easily out compete the mother's own progeny. Unknowingly, she feeds and raises young that are often larger than her. This common occurrence is but a loop in the downward spiral of extinction.

One way to foster the recovery of native bird species is to eliminate these edge areas that attract invading species. With increasing continuous habitat, rarer, and more diverse creatures will find the area more desirable and colonize the land. It is said that variety is the spice of life. In terms of ecosystems, variety is vital. Here at the Byron Forest Preserve, we are trying to manage the land in a way most beneficial to the animals and plants that previously thrived in the area. With continued efforts and observations, the community's ecological health is monitored and guided. Maple Syrup Festival



PrairieView Golf Course 1999 Opening Day!

PrairieView staff and Byron Forest Preserve District officials eagerly anticipate another early opening for the 1999 golf season. Tremendously mild late November and early December helped finish last season with a bang and make the cold months of January and February seem not as long.

PrairieView's target date to officially open the course for play is Monday,

March 1st, if weather and ground conditions allow. Last year, the course opened on March 25, and in 1997 it opened even earlier on March 20, our earliest opening so far. Early season golfers are encouraged to call the course at 234-GOLF for current course conditions and a possible earlier opening date.

As in past years, PrairieView golfers will see many new improvements both on the course and in and around the clubhouse in 1999. The list is long but a few notable items include: completion of the finishing touches to our beautiful new clubhouse landscaping, the addition of a canopy over the new patio, a newly completed bag storage area and separate private conference room

in the lower level of the clubhouse, and new restrooms in the golf pavilion.

Things to look for on the course include: more new tees to be built including many new larger and several longer gold tee boxes, noticably fewer trees to the left and back of #11 green for more sunlight, and an entirely new #11 green to be built in the fall of this year.

As you can see, PrairieView continues to get better and better every year. Come out early and take a look at all the improvements. The clubhouse staff looks forward to seeing you and providing helpful service and information.

PrairieView will continue to sell the "SOFTSPIKE" brand of non-metal spikes at slightly above our cost throughout the spring. The golf course staff would like to thank everyone for their cooperation and understanding of this policy.

New Facilities Ready For Course Opening

After several years of planning and months of construction, PrairieView's new, expanded clubhouse opened in the Spring of 1998. The staff at PrairieView and all our golfers were very pleased with the results and all the beautiful new amenities it has to offer

The final phase of clubhouse renovation - completion of the lower level area below the dining room and pro shop - is now also complete and ready for the 1999 golf season.

This welcome addition includes a private entrance multi-purpose conference/meeting room seating between 18 - 24 people. The room features attractive furnishings, wet bar area, TV/VCR, and other audio/training amenities. Anticipated uses include: Prair- ieView golf club, women's and men's leagues, small outing groups, indoor lessons, Byron golf team, and staff training.

Last year's popular club storage area has been reconfigured with entrances and exits separate from the meeting room. School District are scheduled for Monday, March 22, and Tuesday, March 23. This screening provide you with the opportunity to see how your child is learning and developing.

The screenings serve two purposes. First and foremost, school districts are able to identify children who may be experiencing learning difficulties before these children enter

Kindergarten. There are two FREE preschool programs at Mary Morgan School to serve the children who qualify based on the results of the screening and parent questionnaire. These programs allow the parents and school to work together to better prepare the child for success in Kindergarten.

In addition, these screenings provide an opportunity for parents to talk with school professionals about specific concerns or questions you may have about your child's development, behavior, and learning.

Screenings for the preschoolers (2 years 9 months or older) require about an hour of time and includes a questionnaire for parents to complete. It is recommended that even the children who are age-eligible for Kindergarten should attend the screening. More detailed information about the times, location, and procedure for making an appointment will be available soon. Watch for the details in the local newspapers (Life and Tempo) and flyers will be sent home with Mary Morgan students.
