# PrairieView Opens April

Byron Forest Preserve officials and staff would like to welcome all golfers to another great season of golf at PrairieView.

PrairieView's official opening day, weather permitting, will be on Wednesday, April 5.

Regular spring hours of operation, from 8 a.m. to dusk weekdays and 7 a.m. to dusk on weekends, will be in effect April 5 - April 28.

Many exciting new things are happening this season to make your golfing visit more enjoyable.

Mother Nature, Grounds Superindentent Steve Storz, and his crew are hard at work shaping

up the course for our third full season of play.

Last year, end of the season projects included spreading and seeding over 160 truck loads of topsoil brought in to smooth roughs; more brush and woods clearing; major erosion repairs and sodding (including #5 and #7 fairways); and the addition of three new driving range target greens.

A new practice sand bunker on the driving range will become a reality this year thanks to a generous donation fron the Golf Club at PrairieView golf association.

Other plans include the establishment of native vegetation and prairie areas on the course as PrairieView joins the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program for golf courses.

The PrairieView staff is pleased to present several new savings programs for our golfers benefit and enjoyment:

New daily county green fee rate structure... offers last season's non-resident green fees to county residents at no increase with purchase of county discount ID card. Byron residents with a discount card will also have no increase in daily green fees for the 1995 season. A higher fee out-of-county rate

structure for daily green fees is new for this golf season.

New "VIP" Voucher program for green fees and cart rentals offers Byron and Ogle County residents the opportunity to save seven days a week with the new "combination" green fee/cart pass.

New Driving Range Discount Card saves golfers up to 50 percent on range ball usage. Purchase either the new VIP Voucher or driving range plan by April 1 for maximum savings!

Tee Time Express for quicker, easier phone reservations when making weekly golf reserves. Requires advance registration. Free reserves on weekdays, including Byron discount cardholders and all season passhholders, and \$1 on weekends.

New single rider cart rate on weekdays before 4 p.m. Weekday senior cart special also extended to 4pm on weekdays for 1995 season.

As you can see, exciting new changes are happening at PrairieView! Thanks again to everyone for their continued support for another great year of fun at PrairieView in 1995.

# Pilot "V I P" Voucher Program

## 1995 Summer Junior Lesson Program

Junior lesson registration forms will be accepted starting March 22 at the PrairieView clubhouse from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Early junior class registration, season pass sales, and resident ID card sales will continue from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. March 23-26 and again March 29-April 2. Official opening day for the course is Wednesday, April 5.

# **TURF NOTES**

As I look forward to the fourth golf season at PrairieView, my mind is drawn back to our early developmental stages.

Do you remember when there were bunkers with no sand, washes in fairways too big to cross with a golf cart, and woods rough with brambles as tall as a person?

While I'm thankful we've been able to improve playing conditions beyond that level, there remains, nevertheless, plenty of room for improvement at this young golf course.


I would like to list and briefly describe several Byron Forest Preserve District project goals for PrairieView Golf Course.

In 1995, we will attempt to complete as many of these projects as time and funds will allow:

- Plant More Trees As in previous years, the Golf Division will select the locations and Park Maintenance will transplant the trees from BFPD nurseries.
- Continue Erosion Control Program
   Seed and mulch areas which need more, denser turf.
- Install Practice Sand Bunker at the Driving Range This project was made possible by a donation from the Golf Club of PrairieView.
- Rebuild Bunkers Guarding 6 & 11 Greens The present design causes the sand in them to wash severely whenever it rains.
- Design and Install Native Landscape Plantings - Needed around PrairieView's entrance and clubhouse area.
- Install Drainage Lines In water retention areas, sand bunkers and drainage swales in fairways.

 Continue Working Toward Certification as an Audubon Sanctuary Golf Course -The main thrusts will be to establish new prairie in low play rough areas such as between 7th and 11th fairways, between 7th fairway and the driving range, in front of the 16th tee, and between 17th green and 18th tee, to put out nestboxes and feeders for birds in appropriate locations on the golf course and to create a clubhouse display which will explain the Audubon Sanctuary Program and chart its progress at PrairieView with maps and charts. We also will establish a resource committee composed of local citizens to provide input in the development and implementation of this program.

Our goal is a lofty one: to develop PrairieView into the finest golf facility in this region. With continued cooperation and hard work we can achieve this goal.

# Timberrrrrr!!

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# Audubon Sanctuary Program

Naturalist Josh Skolnick and his two assistants, Todd Tucker and Lisa Johnson, are already hard at work implementing the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program at PrairieView.

The parking areas at the golf course have undergone major changes this spring. Josh and Todd are turning the islands dividing the parking areas into raised beds for prairie plantings.

So far, the two have hauled about 23 tons of native limestone to build two-foot high retaining walls. The areas inside the walls are then filled with a sand and soil mix to mimic dry prairie conditions. A variety of native flowers and grasses will be plugged into the soil mixture.


Josh, along with Lisa and Todd, have carefully selected just the right combinations of prairie plants to provide color throughout the golfing season while also attracting many kinds of birds and butterflies.

Some plants that will be used include nodding onion, little bluestem, lead plant, pale purple coneflower, prairie smoke, blazingstar, lupine, prairie dropseed, spiderwort, and butterfly weed.

These areas are called prairie gardens because they have a higher ratio of blooming plants to grasses than real prairies. These unique gardens will beautify the clubhouse area and, we hope, increase everyone's interest in and knowledge of our native plant species.

The Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program (ACSP) for golf courses is cosponsored by the United States Golf Association and the Audubon Society of New York State.

The purpose of the program is to promote ecologically sound land management and the conservation of our natural resources. The program provides an advisory information service on how to conduct environmental projects on golf courses.

Since PrairieView joined the ACSP last fall, staff members, including Golf Maintenance Superintendent Steve Storz and his crew, have set certification in the program as their goal.

The certification process is designed to recognize and support golf courses which have worked to ensure a high degree of environmental quality on the golf course. To become certified, the course, must complete and manage tasks in seven Achievement Categories: environmental planning, public involvement, wildlife cover enhancement, wildlife food enhancement, integrated pest management, water conservation, and water enhancement.

Once a plan for a category is written and implemented, a certificate of achievement is granted for that category. When all seven categories are accomplished, the golf course will be designated a Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary.

#### "Pace of Play Clocks" Coming Soon!

PrairieView in its continuing efforts to improve speed of play and to make golf more enjoyable will be implementing a new concept to the golf course - Pace of Play Clocks.

Our initial goal will be educational to make all golfers starting off the first tee aware of the pace of play we will be trying to establish as our standard -4 hours and 12 minutes for 18 holes including stopping between nines.

The pace clocks work simply as follows. All five clocks on the course will be synchronized to the pace of 4 hours and 12 minutes for 18 holes. At registration, each group will be told their tee time or have it written on their score card. Whenever a group comes upon any pace clock, whether hole #7 or #16, the time on the clock should come close to matching their tee time if they are on pace.

Slow play can be solved simply if every group maintains the same 8 1/2 minute interval established between groups on the first tee. Then it just becomes a matter of keeping up with the players ahead of you. Everyone must make playing at the proper pace their personal responsibility. Save your learning and practicing for the practice areas!

Watch for the announcement of special our kick-off pace of play day to introduce the pace of play clocks. Spalding Golf has already donated a free two-ball pack of golf balls for the occasion. Watch the clubhouse for an announcement, other activities are being planned as well.

Thanks to our volunteers for making the clocks, and to the Golf Club, especially Fred Brune, for their help in developing and promoting this project.



# PrairieView Needs YOU!!

Prairieview is looking for a few special volunteers interested in helping at the course this season.

The warm, summer months place high demands on the course, especially the extra sensitive tee and green areas. As in the past, our volunteers will be out in force on weekdays helping to repair tee divots with sand and seed mix. This is a very important, but labor intensive, maintenance program that is needed to help maintain our excellent tee conditions. We encourage anyone interested to sign-up and help out.

Also, with ever increasing play, there is a need for more ranger coverage. The golf course will have full, all day weekend ranger coverage for the first time this summer. We still have a need to supplement the paid staff with volunteers, however.

In the new Volunteer Ranger "Eyes and Ears" program, authorized, volunteer golfers are issued two-way radios and they simply call back to the clubhouse to notify staff of established rule violations. Staff will handle any situation at this point and the volunteer can continue playing golf.

The second volunteer ranger program available is one where individuals perform full, on-course ranger duties on a regular schedule and do not play golf at the same time. We encourage anyone who is interested in either program or has any questions to stop in and see Ken at the clubhouse or call (815) 234-4653.

## **Course Etiquette**

The pro shop is well supplied with ball mark repair tools, including a sturdy, inexpensive economy model! Please purchase one and use it often! It only takes a few seconds to repair a mark and to "leave the green in at least as good a condition as you found it" for the group to follow. If every golfer fixed his own mark and one other, all our greens would be void of ball marks at all times. Try it!


Our new practice range bunker is expected to be ready and in use by the time you read this. Funds for the project were generously donated by the Golf Club of PrairieView this past spring.

# Junior News

## Junior Golf League Proposed

Qualified youth interested in playing in a morning junior golf league, should sign-up at the PrairieView clubhouse as soon as possible. The new proposed league is being formed to give our older, more experienced junior golfers the opportunity to become involved in organized play on a weekly basis.

A player signing up for the league must be 12 years old or older, must have had more than one year's experience of playing nine holes or more without an adult, must have good knowledge of rules and etiquette, and must be committed to playing on a weekly basis.

Adult volunteers and clubhouse staff will be involved initially, but the goal is for the junior golf league players to eventually manage the league themselves with minimal adult assistance.

Tentatively, the league will play on Mondays at 8am. Play begins in mid-June.



# **Mini-Series Junior Lessons**

PrairieView is offering a new four-session, mini-series lesson program for junior golfers age 18 or under starting in June. The four sessions will be completed in a period of two weeks.

Classes cover basic full swing and short game fundamentals including wood and iron shots, sand play, chipping/pitching, and putting. Classes are limited to only four students allowing for more personal instruction and attention.

Students signing up for the junior mini-series must be of similar age and experience. The series includes four hours of instruction for a fee of \$25 per student including range balls. Rental clubs are available. Please call Ken at (815) 234-4653 for more information and to sign up.

## 1995 Junior Lesson Program

PrairieView kicks off its eight-week summer junior lesson program on Monday, June 12 this season. The program, available to 7-17 year old boys and girls living in the Byron area, reached full enrollment of 118 students in early May.

Student class assignments are made on the basis of age and experience. Class sessions will be once a week on either Monday or Thursday. The entire program concludes in early August with a combined golf tournament/picnic for all students.

Class content will include an introduction to basic golf fundamentals, equipment, rules and etiquette, and oncourse play. Following the weekly instruction, students will have the opportunity to play up to nine holes on the golf course based on their experience level.

Adult and parent volunteers are needed on both Mondays and Thursdays. Minimal or no golf experience is necessary for some of the volunteer assignments, such as check-in, food, and class aides to help with the younger students. Adult/parent volunteers are a key element to the continued success of the program. We thank all of you who have helped in the past and we hope to see you again this year!



The beautiful new amenity to the course is a joint effort of the Golf Club at PrairieView, several board members, and the golf course staff. A big thank you to all the individuals who donated many hours of labor to make this project possible. Several regular golfers gave up valuable weekend golf playing time more than once to help in the construction.

Plans call for staffing the concession area on weekends and busy days from mid-morning until mid-afternoon. Most quick snack items, including candy, chips, beer, etc. will be available for sale. Please remember to make your purchases without delay to not adversely affect pace of play.



## **Audubon Sanctuary Program Progresses**

As a part of its involvement in the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary System, the Byron Forest Preserve's Nature Department staff members have been planting prairie areas on PrairieView Golf Course.

Our first prairie planting, located at the PrairieView sign at the corner of North River and North German Church Roads, is doing well. Twenty-nine different species were plugged in, including leadplant, white indigo, nodding wild onion, compass plant and blazingstar.

At the beginning of July, five species were already blooming: pale purple coneflower, wild quinine, spiderwort, butterfly weed and black-eyed susan. Thanks to Diane Balch for the mature purple coneflower plants, which are also blooming.

Because the Golf Maintenance staff pitched in to help with watering, almost all the plants survived the dry, hot weather.

Be sure to stop between holes 16 and 17 to take a look at the unfolding beauty of our native prairie flowers.

The prairie gardens in the clubhouse parking lots are also taking shape. Eighteen and one-half tons of limestone blocks were used to build the walls. They were then filled with 90 yards - that's about 15 dump truck loads - of sand and soil mix.

More than 24 different species of prairie plants have been planted. For spring bloom we have pasque flower, prairie smoke, wild lupine, and cream indigo.

Some summer blooming species are butterfly weed, pale purple coneflower, black-eyed susan, coreopsis, wild petunia, purple and white prairie clover and cinquefoil.





Ledene said Foster put on a clinic for young golfers after the show. He worked individually with each youngster, watching while each hit a couple of shots and offering personal tips.



#### JUNIOR GOLF LESSON PROGRAM


The PrairieView summer junior lesson program is winding down to its conclusion on Monday, August 7 with a picnic lunch, games, and a tournament.

#### **Audubon Sanctuary Program Progresses**

The fall bloomers will be flowering spurge, silky aster, smooth aster and rough blazingstar. Three prairie grasses were mixed in: little bluestem, prairie dropseed and junegrass.

Many species of birds have been seen nesting on and near the golf course. Killdeer and horned larks nest right on the ground while bluebirds and tree swallows use the nest boxes put up by the staff and volunteers. Many species can be heard singing around the wooded areas. Listen for catbirds, orioles, vireos, wrens, cardinals and woodpeckers.

We hope to see and hear more and more of these wild ones as we create more habitat for them to live in. Thanks to all the golfers and golf course staff who have been patient with and supportive of our work.

The Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program (ACSP) for golf courses is cosponsored by the United States Golf Association and the Audubon Society of New York State.

The purpose of the program is to promote ecologically sound land management and the conservation of our natural resources. The program provides an advisory information service on how to conduct environmental projects on golf courses.

Since PrairieView joined the ACSP last fall, staff members, including Golf Maintenance Superintendent Steve Storz and his crew, have set certification in the program as their goal.

The certification process is designed to recognize and support golf courses which have worked to ensure a high degree of environmental quality on the golf course. To become certified, the course, must complete and manage tasks in seven Achievement Categories: environmental planning, public involvement, wildlife cover enhancement, wildlife food enhancement, integrated pest management, water conservation, and water enhancement.

Once a plan for a category is written and implemented, a certificate of achievement is granted for that category. When all seven categories are accomplished, the golf course will be designated a Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary.

# CART CONTROL

As a follow-up to an article in the Spring newsletter, we announced the addition of the new white and red-tipped cart control stakes located around greens, tees, and other sensitive areas on the golf course. The purpose of the stakes was to direct motorized carts away from restricted driving areas and to eliminate the need for miles of directional rope.

The golf course staff is happy to announce that the golfers have been very cooperative in following this trial program. The turf on the moguls and in close in areas around the greens look great as a result, even during a dry summer. Steve and his crew also appreciate the time savings to them by eliminating all the rope and stakes needed in the old method.

Please keep up the good work for the remainder of the season.


#### **PrairieView Gets Donation**

The family of John Ferb established the fund in his memory at the Byron Park District, where he served as the board president. Ferb was also a Byron School Board member for many years.





# TURF NOTES

Despite record heat and humidity, PrairieView sustained minimal turf loss during the summer of '95.

Unlike the staff at many other Midwest golf courses, our Golf Maintenance Division did not have to spend considerable time and money overseeding and sodding damaged areas. We worked on course improvement projects instead.

The Park and Golf Maintenance Departments joined forces to plant 260 new trees and shrubs in various locations on the course.

These, plus 70 new trees, planted during the spring planting season will have major impact on PrairieView's playability and aesthetic appeal in 1996. Look for significant tree groupings to the left of 1, 6, 11, 12, 13 and 16 fairways and shrub planting behind 7 and 13 greens.

I think it is important to note that all the red, sugar and silver maples, green ash, walnuts, spruce, pines and gray and red dogwoods planted this year, came from the Byron Forest Preserve's own tree nurseries. Using even a VERY conservative estimated purchase price of \$40 per plant, the cost savings to the Byron Forest Preserve District is \$13,200 (\$40 x 330 plants).

The Golf Maintenance Division worked with an independent contractor to install tile and French drains in PrairieView's three worst drainage problem areas.

These include a couple of very soggy areas 200 yards out on hole number two, the green bunkers on hole number 17, and the two right green bunkers on hole number 16.

We removed the old, silty soil from the bunkers before drainage work and then added 130 tons of new sand. I think anyone who played PrairieView in 1995 will appreciate the benefits of this project next year.

This winter, Audubon Sanctuary planning sessions will continue. Our goal is to achieve certifications in at least of the seven categories in 1996. (Please note the related Audubon Sanctuary article and photographs in the district newsletter.)

One will provide for the placement of 1700 tons of much-needed sand in PrairieView's bunkers, while the other will finish the installation of drainage tile in PrairieView's remaining wet areas.
