BYRON LIONS CLUB HUNT GROWS

For the past two years, the Byron Lions Club has held its annual Easter Egg Hunt at the present front door of the Prairie Preserve. This year, over 200 cars and an estimated 600 people participated.

Due to the number of cars and people, the forest preserve board has authorized the director to relocate the hunt in 1989 to an area inside the preserve that will accommodate all the cars and to retain traffic control. Additionally, the number of prizes will be expanded with every child receiving something, as well as his eggs.

Sidewalks, cars, and people pelting tends to occur most during the time our winged friends pass through.

Several solutions have been used by communities and individuals over the years to include clapping boards, carbide cannons, lights, and even firearms. However, a good solution for some is a little simpler, especially if your not faint of heart.

PRAIRIE PLANTING

More and more people are learning the value of prairie planting around their homes and even farms.

Native grasses and flowers require the least amount of care and maintenance of any ground cover. When you put a dollar value to the maintenance of one (1) acre of the blue grass as opposed to one (1) acre of prairie, you find it runs around \$1,200 to only \$25 per acre of prairie.

In deciding on the type of planting, you need to know several things. You should be aware of the following:

- 1. Site Preparation
- 2. Planting Times
- 3. Installation Techniques
- 4. Irrigation Needs
- 5. Mulching Techniques
- 6. Rodent Control
- 7. Weed Control


The Byron Forest Preserve District is presently maintaining and up-grading over 100 acres of prairie. Additionally, it has developed three (3) small, demonstration prairies for the public to observe and enjoy.

One is located next to the Tempo office in Byron, one is located at Mrs. Debnam's on Third Street, and the third and largest is near the entrance of the prairie preserve, 7993 River Road. Each is in various stages of development, and all have a balance of forbs and grasses.

FEEDING TO ATTRACT SONG BIRDS

Most of us love to see birds all year long. Some of us even pay extra when we build our homes, in order ot have a big window to watch them.

However, many of us don't know how to attract them.

The single, most important element is to provide the right feed all year long.

The late E. Lowell Kammerer published an excellent Plant Information Bulletin in 1952 for the Morton Arboretum, and it was revised in the spring of 1975.

Here are a few tips it includes:

Trees

Red chokeberry

Attract 21 kinds

21 kinds of birds including bob-white, brown thrasher, catbirds, meadowhawk

bluebirds, cedar waxwing,

93 kinds of birds

including cardinals,

Siberian dogwood Pagoda dogwood Silky dogwood Cornelian cherry Gray dogwood

Cornelian cherry downy woodpecker, robin, Gray dogwood flicker, song sparrow

Washington hawthorn 39 kinds of birds including,

Washington hawthor Russian olive Burning bush 39 kinds of birds including, fox sparrow, purple finch, king bird, hermit thrush

To attract our feathered friends, we don't need to rely just on putting out seed for them if we do a little supplemental planting of the right varieties of plants.

BYRON FOREST PRESERVE IS GROWING

With the negotiated purchase of the additional 340 plus acres of land adjacent to the existing prairie preserve, the Byron Forest Preserve District has completed its major land acquisition plan adopted in 1982.

As a policy, the board has concentrated on a single, large site that will serve as many public needs as possible, without the added cost of multiple spread out locations.

Today, the only land owned by the district is the 550 acres at the intersection of German Church Road and River Road and a small nine (9) acre donated site called Heleo, which is adjacent to Route Two, two (2) miles south of Byron.

SEEDLING PROJECT

Two years ago, the Byron Forest Preserve District applied for a ten-year grant to be used for rehabilitating over 170 acres of the original 220-acre Prairie Site. The grant, funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, was available to individuals and agencies that were farming highly erodible soil. The department received thousands of seedlings to be used to refurbish twenty acres of the land as well as over \$2,000 in labor and seed reimbursement.

For the next nine years, the district is to receive over \$8,000 per year to continue to upgrade the land, as long as it is not farmed.

Due to the drought last year, the department will receive over 10,000 seedlings from the Illinois Department of Conservation this spring to be used to replace last year's plantings that were killed. The seedlings are being supplied, at no charge, to the Byron Forest Preserve District.


